RESILIENCY, HOPE, & WATER IN THE BASEMENT

It has been a challenging year at the clinic... and that is an understatement. Despite the hardships and changes that we have endured, one thing strikes me about our patients, families, and staff: **RESILIENCY**.

As I write this, we are enduring the aftermath of a major flood in our facility. On October 16, several of our staff members noticed water pouring into our basement from a wall. During a construction project on Lime Street (unrelated to our building), workers accidentally punctured a water main underneath an old bridge that was a part of the Pennsylvania Railroad. This led to the accumulation of eight inches of water in our lower level and damage that is still being assessed and remediated. Our lower level houses the office space for several staff members, dental mechanical equipment, two conference spaces, a staff lounge and kitchen, HVAC equipment, and multiple research projects that contain decades of material.



The good news in this scenario is that we were able to resume clinical services within a day and a half of the flood. Our staff bent over backwards to deal with this situation and kept its focus exactly where it needed to be: on those we serve.

When life hands you ‘lemons,’ it’s important to maintain a good sense of perspective and make lemonade. Our facility headaches pale in comparison to the day-to-day challenges that our patients face. This understanding keeps us

grounded and with our eye on the prize. We get to help to provide a beautiful smile and the opportunity for a fulfilling life for our patients! They are the reason that we work as hard as we do.

As a pediatric dentist, I provide much of my clinical care in a hospital setting, treating children with complex health problems and a high burden of dental disease. Anyone who spends a good amount of time in a pediatric hospital witnesses families in their most vulnerable state. As a practitioner, it is my job to bring hope, knowledge, and the highest quality of care to my patients. Empowering each child’s family helps to ensure the best possible outcomes. I take that responsibility very seriously, as does every member of our team.

Our patients face up to two decades of treatment due to their facial differences. Surgery after surgery, and treatment after treatment, one thing stands out to me: the resiliency of our patients and families. They face their burdens head on and with bravery!

As we leave 2019 behind us, we are about to embark upon a hopeful, transformational change at the clinic. This project will improve patient care and comfort and allow us to grow in a sustainable manner to bring our care to more children in

Pennsylvania. Stay tuned as we look forward to an exciting announcement in 2020!

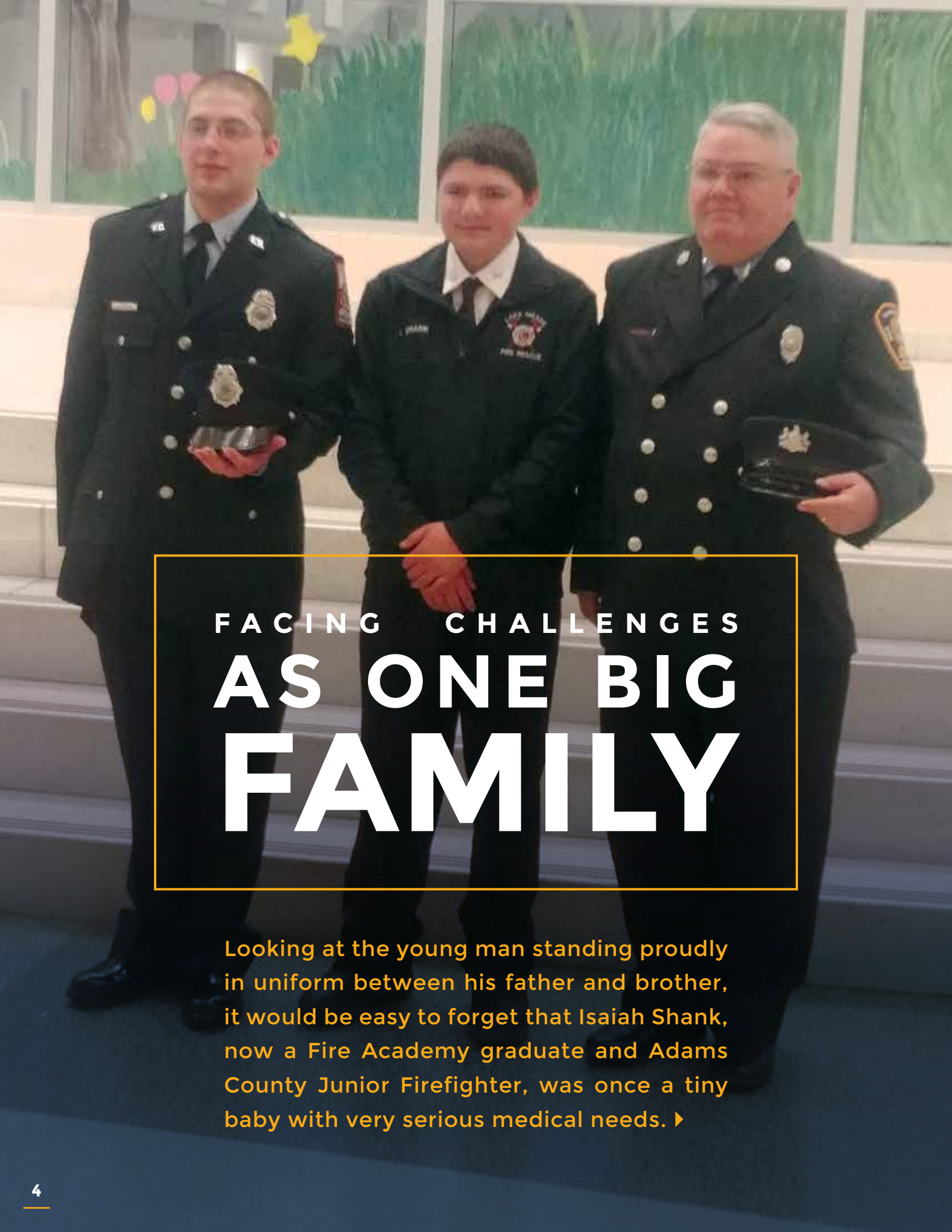

FACING CHALLENGES
**AS ONE BIG
FAMILY**

Looking at the young man standing proudly in uniform between his father and brother, it would be easy to forget that Isaiah Shank, now a Fire Academy graduate and Adams County Junior Firefighter, was once a tiny baby with very serious medical needs. ▶

Cindy Shank, Isaiah's mother, was 20 weeks pregnant when she and her husband, Dean, received the news that their baby would be born with a cleft palate. When Isaiah was born, the Shanks were referred to Lancaster Cleft Palate Clinic (LCPC) which was an hour away from them.

"He was born in Hershey, so we were confused why we had to come to Lancaster," said Cindy, about the referral. "But we don't have any regrets!"

Isaiah, now 15, had ten surgeries and seven years of speech therapy to bring him to the place he is today. His parents attribute his progress to the care of his medical team.

The first time the Shanks visited LCPC, Isaiah was two weeks old. They came to find the best bottle for him to use with the cleft. Isaiah was considered a moderate case and care started immediately. His surgeries were at Hershey, but all of his follow-up care took place at LCPC.

"I like that we can go to one place for all of his facial and dental care," said Dean. "It makes for such a smooth process. Everyone is right there in the same place and looking at the same chart for him."

The Shanks attended Team Tuesdays twice a year at LCPC. They still come down once a year to see all of his specialists at once. "Isaiah has an ENT doctor, an audiology doctor, an orthodontist," said Cindy. "And he gets all his care done at LCPC, even dental cleanings."

In the midst of the adjustments that come with caring for a child with a cleft palate, the Shanks were reassured by the variety of care that LCPC had available for Isaiah all in one place.

"It's not an easy thing to hand your baby over for surgery. One surgery was five hours long," Cindy remembered. "You have to be 100% comfortable with your medical staff. Everyone at LCPC was awesome, and we felt confident that Isaiah was in the best hands."

Cindy and Dean deeply appreciated the time and the commitment that the staff invested into caring for Isaiah over the years. "Dr. Rusty and Dr. Mackay are really good," said Cindy. "They took extra time explaining things to us."

Isaiah's care has been personalized particularly for him. "He's doing very well now and has not been in therapy anymore," Cindy shared. "We're coming to the end of all of the necessary cleft care."

Isaiah reflected on the amount of care he received from LCPC and determined that, in his opinion, the best part about it was the speech therapy. "When I started talking, I couldn't make all the sounds," said Isaiah. "But I've come a long way in my speech."

The speech aspect has been of particular importance for Isaiah because he cherishes the ambition to become a firefighter. As a junior firefighter now in Adams County, he knows the importance of successful communication, and the therapy has made a big impact. "Communication is key," he said.

The quantity and the quality of LCPC's care for patients and families has lasting impact on those that walk through their doors. Cindy says when she thinks of the clinic staff, "They all became one big family to us."

LCPC RECEIVES SIZEABLE GRANT FOR RENOVATION PROJECT

\$1.2 million from Pennsylvania’s Redevelopment Assistance Capital Grant Program (RACP) will be granted to Lancaster Cleft Palate Clinic.

Liz Prada says, “We are truly honored to be one of only four Lancaster recipients of these highly competitive grants awarded state-wide. We are thrilled these dollars will be put to great use for the care and support of children and families in Lancaster.”



The \$1.2 million from RACP must be matched dollar-for-dollar. The LCPC Board and fundraising volunteers are working hard to match the state grant with a minimum of 150% from charitable gift fundraising; donations from community partners.

LCPC is deeply grateful for support garnered thus far. Representative Mike Sturla was the first legislator to encourage and assist LCPC in competing for the RACP grant. Representative Brian Cutler was also a major leader in the pursuit, as was Senator Scott Martin and the entire Lancaster delegation. LCPC is honored that that both sides of the political aisle came together in support of the clinic and the children and families we serve.

A NEW FACE IN THE CLINIC

While our clinic has many smiling faces to greet your patients and their families—and we wish you could meet them all!—we’re introducing Neishma Tudor, a Registered Dental Hygienist. Neishma says she came to the clinic for the “opportunity to work with an amazing organization.” She has over a dozen years of experience but has been specializing in pediatrics for the last five years. Neishma says, “My patients are unique because no matter what cranial facial defect or disability they are born with, they continue to live life to their fullest. I get more from my patients than what I’m able to give them!”

Neishma was born and raised in Puerto Rico. She came to Pennsylvania for high school, then moved to Baltimore. Now that she’s back in Pennsylvania with her husband and 3-year-old son Ian, we are honored to have Neishma on the team.

Lancaster Cleft Palate Clinic and Penn State Hershey Medical Center have enjoyed a strong, long-standing relationship that began in 1970—and unofficially, much earlier, when our founder H. K. Cooper first created Milton Hershey’s own dentures!

Three surgeons from Penn State Hershey Medical Center donate their time on Team Days to travel to LCPC and meet with patients. No financial support is provided to the Medical Center for the surgeons’ presence at the clinic, and we are thankful that Hershey allows the surgeons to make the trek to assist their LCPC patients.

Patients visit LCPC for pre- and post-surgery treatments. LCPC coordinates planning and post-operative care, while all surgeries are conducted at Hershey.

“Without that partnership, we could not do what we do,” says Liz Prada. “It’s huge.”

One important interaction LCPC patients have is the benefit of access to Hershey ENTs off-site. Because it is almost certain that children born with cleft palates will need ear care and ear tubes at some point, surgical services can be coordinated by LCPC with the ENTs and surgical department of Hershey.

Therapies can also often be performed at the same time so that children do

not have to endure multiple hospital trips and separate procedures. Because all of the specialists are under one roof, many procedures can often be accomplished in one visit.

Dr. Tom Samson is one of the surgeons who volunteers his time to visit patients at LCPC and perform surgeries for them. “It’s extremely important for us all to be under the same roof

to provide the highest level of care that we can,” he says.

Dr. Samson continues to work with LCPC for one important reason—people, both his patients and the group of people he gets to work with in Lancaster.

“At LCPC, it’s a group effort and no one is more important than the next,” said Samson.

LCPC depends on financial support from the community in order to uphold our mission—that no child will be turned away due to their inability to pay. Therefore, LCPC remains exceedingly grateful for our partners across the state that support our mission.

“Our goal is to make patients whole again,” said Dr. Samson. “That’s our mission for all our kids, regardless if they can pay the bill or not. It’s only the support of the people throughout the state that helps us continue to provide the level of excellent care for our patients.”

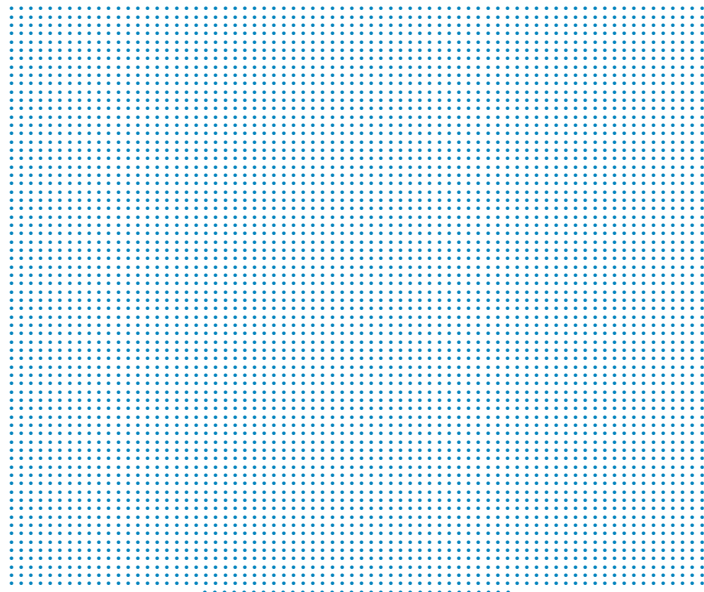

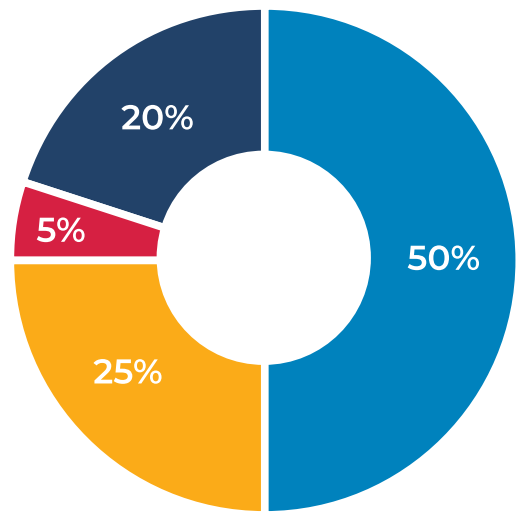

- Dental decay is **more common** in children who have a cleft as compared to those without a cleft.
- Dental decay is the most common chronic disease of childhood with 25% of children from **low-income families** entering kindergarten without ever having seen a dentist.¹
- Even when controlling for insurance status, **low-income and minority children** remain **less likely** than their peers to receive preventive dental care.²
- More than 25% of children have **tooth decay** in baby teeth before entering kindergarten.³

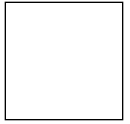
